WESTHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the Full Council Meeting in January Councillors resolved;

- to buy a new boiler for Westham Village Hall at a cost of £1596.00 including VAT
- to accept the price from Hailsham Roadways to effect a repair in Stour Close
- that Westham Parish needs Superfast Broadband and agreed the Clerk should register their support for ESCC on the BDUK website.
- that the Clerk gets prices to carry out the works identified by the parks inspections.
- to invite the new Road Steward to the next Full Council Meeting to ask his advice as regards to parking in Westham at school times and the possibility of putting extra bollards on the verges.
- that extensive repairs are needed at Westham Pond and considered three quotes. Councillors agreed to accept the quote from Land and Water Services, the funding of which is;
 - i: £ 5000.00 from Westham Parish Council
 - ii: £22866.10 from grants and local businesses.
- that they fully support Cllr Marshall's bids for grant funding. The Clerk is to get costings for the preliminary work and Cllr Marshall is to ask local businesses for their support.
- to get prices for the works highlighted in the Tree Report.
- to accept the Schedule of Works drafted by Gerry Garner for Foxes Hollow Wall and ask the Clerk to get two prices to repair the wall as per the Schedule.
- to form a sub committee to consider the Neighbourhood Plan comprising of all councillors to draft the plan. AiRS are to be invited to the next Full Council Meeting.

At Planning Committee Meeting in February Councillors considered the four options in the Wealden's Strategic Site Development Plan Consultation and agreed unanimously to support option 3 (land at - Friday Street, South and North of Rattle Road, North of Dittons Road and part of Dittons Nursery). They felt option 3 has less impact on this parishes' infrastructure, has better access, there will be less traffic.

In this consultation document Wealden have identified suitable areas for the development of 650 new homes in the Stone Cross area. The report highlights two key areas

- Land to the east of Stone Cross comprising three key sites: one at Friday street, one to the north of Rattle Road and one to the south of Rattle Road
- Land to the north and west of Stone Cross and comprises four sites in total. Two of these sites are located to the north of Dittons Road, one to the south of Dittons Road and one to the east of Hailsham Road

Police non-emergency number

On the 1 November police forces throughout England and Wales switched from their various non emergency contact numbers to 101.

Sussex Police have been preparing for months for the switch over and have been live testing the 101 number since July 2011 in order to monitor how well the technology works.

Calls to the 101 non-emergency number will cost 15 pence for the entire call, no matter how long the call or what time of day it is. This applies to both landlines and mobile phones. In an emergency, callers should still dial 999, which is free. Those members of the public with impaired hearing or speech can still use the textphone -18001 101.

You can also report most non-emergency crime at no cost via the Sussex Police website at

www.sussex.police.uk/contact-us/report-a-crime-or-incident.

Online crime reporting was introduced back in January of last year and has proven very popular with many of the public who prefer this method of contacting the police rather than phoning.

When a member of the public calls 101, the system will determine the caller's location and connect them to the police force covering that area. They will hear a recorded message announcing which police force they are being connected to. If a caller is on a boundary between two or more forces, the recorded message will give them a choice of which force to be connected to.

Police call handlers in the force control room for that area will then answer the calls and respond appropriately. The caller will not be put through to a large national call centre.

Watch out for the doorstep sellers

A general warning is being issued to residents across East Sussex to be wary of doorstep sellers. The warning follows complaints to East Sussex County Council's Trading Standards team about a doorstep salesman trying to flog items of kitchenware.

The salesman, who drives a silver people carrier and is thought to be operating across the County, is selling 'Kaiserbach' knives, saucepans and cutlery sets. He claims that the cutlery is left over from a trade fair.

Trading Standards is concerned that consumers are being duped into the sale, not given the option to cancel or change their minds and feel the items are possibly being misrepresented.

Councillor Maynard, Lead Member for Economy, Transport and Environment said "Our warning to consumers across the County is to be very cautious of any cold callers. People should remember that, if they purchase products or services costing over £35 on their doorstep, they have a seven-day cooling off period in which time to change their mind. This must be provided by the seller at the time of sale in writing".

Door to door sellers should;

- show identification that gives their name and their company name
- make it clear from the start of your conversation that they are selling something
- not pressure you into buying something

Most people who call at your home will be genuine. But sometimes people turn up unannounced with the intention of tricking people either by high pressure selling or using false identification. If you are in any doubt don't let them in.

Official visitors should always arrange an appointment beforehand. If you're not expecting them and you are alone then ask them to call back later when you have somebody with you – legitimate callers will always be happy to do this.

Switchover Help Scheme

TV is going digital all over the UK and is the biggest change in television since the introduction of colour. In 2012 analogue television will be switched off across Meridian TV region. If you don't have digital TV by the time of switchover, you will lose your TV channels.

For older and disabled viewers who may find making the switch difficult, the BBC-run Switchover Help Scheme is at hand to provide everything you need to switch one TV set to digital. Most eligible people will be asked to pay £40 towards the standard option of help. For eligible people on income-related benefits, it's free. This includes easy to use equipment, an approved installer to supply and install the equipment, and a 12 month aftercare service including a free helpline. If you're 75 and over or eligible disabled, the Help Scheme will write to you directly and in plenty of time to ask if you want help.

The Help Scheme will not cold call. Our CRB checked installers will visit by appointment only and are trained and experienced in serving both older and disabled people. They will take extra time, for example, if you need more time to answer the door. Our installers always carry ID and you can arrange for a password in advance. We also encourage anyone who is unsure to call the Help Scheme on 0800 40 85 900 to verify the person at the door.

STONE CROSS WINDMILL



The Windmill Tower is still encased with plastic having been sand blasted to remove old paint and discoloration. The final cleaning and painting should be undertaken soon so that the Mill can be restored to its former glory. The trust has found it necessary to remove the sweeps, stocks and cap for this major overhaul.

Stone Cross Tower Windmill was built in 1876 and is generally considered to be one of the finest late generation windmills to be built in England. It is a Grade 11* listed Windmill and is certainly one of the most complete and retains all of its original machinery. It attracts enthusiasts from all over the Country and also abroad

The Mill was restored to working order in 2000 with a lottery grant and is owned and maintained by the Stone Cross Mill Trust, registered charity No. 1052827.

The Windmill produces modest amounts of wholemeal stone ground flour from locally grown wheat, which is sold to the public and small businesses.

The Mill is open to the public from Easter (or April) to the end of September and guided tours are available to visitors by volunteer guides. Entry is free and the Mill relies solely on flour sales, donations and membership for its income. The principle aim is to preserve the Windmill as part of our heritage as well as to increase awareness of the Mill as a tourist and educational attraction.

It now has a Heritage Centre providing a venue for local craft fairs and a meeting place for Harvest Festivals and Carol Services.

The Mill Store is adjacent to the Windmill and offers light refreshments whenever the Mill is open to the public and also houses the disabled toilet. The Mill Store sells flour, souvenirs and provides a meeting place for local people to sit and enjoy refreshments and cakes prepared with flour produced by the Mill.

Groups are welcomed by appointment and Cream Teas are arranged with cakes and scones made with the flour. School Groups visit during the year as part of the National Curriculum.

The Friendship Lunch Group



The Friendship Lunch Group – has 22 regulars on the list and always welcomes visitors and newcomers 10.30-1.30 Tuesdays at Westham Village Hall. A recent inspection gave the Group a Food Hygiene rating of 5, that's top marks!

The increased cost of living has had its effect and FLG has been forced to raise the price for lunch to £5. It was previously £4.50. Members considered the options and felt that £5 was very reasonable – there is no membership fee. In January the Annual General Meeting accepted the report and accounts and re-elected the executive team. So apart from the 50p increase all is as usual.

All people are getting older of course, but, when it comes to counting the years, the Friendship Lunchers' get off to a flying start! They know more about the Battle of Britain and being a Land Girl than they do about computers, emails, spreadsheets, and desktop publishing. Thanks to a grandchild, one member is learning to text. They look hopefully for new younger people to come, maybe in their sixties, familiar with the digital age and computers, who might be willing to take responsibility, as a bank signatory, or a treasurer, or publicity designer or with Food Hygiene qualifications to be the licensee.

Meantime FLG members look after each other and enjoy themselves. There's conversation, chancing a raffle, playing bagatelle, table quoits and small group "countdown", there is no formal programme. Sometimes they go out. Lunch is like a family meal, one person at the table serves the main dish and others pass the plates and vegetables. Special diets are supplied.

Westham Parish Council provides precept money to WPLTP. Their community based bus services do great job for this community. Struggling with rising fuel prices, reduced government fuel subsidy and the maintenance of an ageing minibus is not easy. Pevensey Parish Council provides precept too. Last July WPLTP became a Registered Charity No. 1142981. Now enrolled for on-line giving with www.sussexgiving.com it is easy for anyone who can afford it to make their donations on line. Or send a cheque to WPLTP care of the Parish Office.

What's new? What a super looking minibus. It's still the same vehicle but it "scrubbed up well" The new livery that catches the eye is a gift from the nationally known designer, Ray Stenning of Best Impressions. He gave his talents and skills, arranged for Smart Graphics to give the vinyls, and asked Stagecoach to accommodate the paint shop work. Since 1 May 2011, WPLTP has been the operator of these services, and had to move away from CCB design and logos.

Volunteer your skills in company management. Grasp the WPLTP ethos and vision, but do your own typing! Committee every 6 weeks. NB The Company Secretary is wearing out !

What does WPLTP do? It operates mini-bus services; Westham & Pevensey Rover 6, Tuesdays (via Langney Shops) and Wednesdays (via Hailsham). Book this door-to-door service – phone 0845 606 6951 the day before. WPLTP operates Local Shopper Service 46, Saturdays. No booking needed for this bus-stop route around Langney Shops, ASDA, Beachlands, Westham and Pevensey.

Who are these bus services for? They're for all of us! Just show your concessionary pass or pay as you board. (Flat fare £2, £1 for children). It's public transport for Stone Cross, Pevensey, Beachlands, Hankham, Westham with walk-on low-floor access and room for one wheelchair.

This is a chance to say "Thank you" to the local people who are the unpaid volunteers that keep the mini-bus services running.
